## A. OLD SERIES

Schechter was the first to sort the fragments according to subject matter but during his and later activity many were set aside and designated as unimportant and even “rubbish”. At this early stage three methods of storage were employed for the sorted fragments. Approximately 1,900 were placed between glass and the remainder, which have been estimated at about 28,000 were either mounted on paper and bound into volumes or placed in folders and stored in boxes. For the bound fragments and those in one group of boxes,

letters of the alphabet up to K (minus I), followed by a box number, served as a key for classification. A second group of boxes carried the classification Miscellaneous (- Misc.), followed by the box number. In the case of fragments in Judaeo-Arabic or Arabic characters, the classification Arabic (= Ar.), preceding the box number, was employed for the boxed fragments, while the letters of the alphabet up to K. were again used for the bound volumes but with the addition of a lower-case 'a'. To distinguish the bound volumes from the boxes the longer dimension of the volume, in inches, preceded the classmark, so that 10C1 is a bound volume while C1 is a box. The fragments between glass were simply given two numbers, the first indicating the size in inches, and the second the fragment number, e. g. 32.1.

The following summary of these parts of the Collection (plus the 'Oriental Boxes' of the University Library Collection) is only a general guide to the contents but will be found useful:

## B. THE NEW SERIES (= NS)

About fifty years ago scholars began to sort the material which had been designated as unimportant and a new class mark, T-S NS (= New Series) was introduced. The matter of the storage of the NS fragments was given close study and it was finally decided to place the processed fragments into made-to-measure envelopes, and ‘Melinex’, a transparent polyester film, was chosen as the material. The ‘Melinex’ envelopes are sewn on to large uniform-sized ‘Melinex’ sheets which are then placed into loose-leaf binders.



The sorting of the fragments has been done over a number of years by various devoted scholars, each with his own interests and each employing his own methods and terminology. Descriptions are to a large extent general and approximate, and fragments often do not appear under the obvious heading. Work on the NS fragments is still in progress [in 1973] and when it is completed a revision of these descriptions and a more detailed and accurate summary of the box contents will have to be undertaken. In the meantime, however it has been felt that the following guide, for all its shortcomings, is the best that is available at the time of writing and will no doubt be found useful:
