## Sharing Work in CORE (from https://hcommons.org/core/faq/)

• How do I know if I can legally deposit an article I've published elsewhere?

Policies vary by publisher and journal. Look up the journal or publisher name in the SHERPA-RoMEO database to find out its policies covering archiving and deposit.

If you wish to deposit a book chapter or a monograph, please check your agreement with the publisher.
